Most of these are maritimers who are some distant from adequate medical facilities, which have their own Net on the HF bands, the Maritime Mobile Net, where maritimers can check in for help, pass traffic and get Weather (WX) information.

There are other members of the Ham Radio community who also use ham radio to provide services to those in need, Doctors without Boarders comes to mind. While Old Timers (OTs) are aware of these types of operations, many of the newer members of our fraternity may not be. Most of us have heard about amateur radio operators assisting in emergency situations like Hurricane Katrina, however there are many other facets of our hobby such as the ham station at the National Hurricane Center to the Hurricane Watch Net, the Waterway Net, Skywarn and the Salvation Army Team Emergency Radio Network (SATERN). All of these use ham radio to serve our communities.

Welcome Technicians to HF Weekend!

To celebrate their arrival and welcome Technician class licensees to HF, Friday, February 23, 2007 through Sunday, February 25, 2007 has been designated as "Welcome Technicians to HF Weekend"! Of the 655,129 US Amateur Radio licensees, 323,443 (49%) are Technicians, so the number of potential HF operators will effectively double overnight!

Most Technicians will probably be eager to explore their new 10-meter phone privileges first. Since we are at the bottom of the cycle and sky wave contacts may be difficult on 10 meters, all hams are encouraged to monitor 28.365 throughout the weekend to contact and welcome as many Technician licensees as possible.

While Technicians can operate SSB anywhere between 28.300 and 28.500, setting a "meeting" frequency will increase the likelihood of successful contacts and a positive first impression of HF if the band isn't open. Of course, if the band is open, calling CQ anywhere in the sub band will likely yield positive results!

An Affordable PC oscilloscope

I know, I know! I promised not to write anything more for awhile but I just had to let you know about a terrific product I found on the web. Consider it a new year's resolution broken.

As you know, I build a lot of my own equipment but without a good oscilloscope to check waveforms it's like flying blind without a compass and trying to find parts for a smoked 60 year old *Tektronix* is like looking for fleas on an elephant. Browsing the web one day, I found a better solution - an affordable PC oscilloscope that, in many ways, outshines the *Tektronix* at a fraction of what it would cost to repair it! Check out www.apogeekits.com for a full description and price list.

If you're not familiar with the term PC oscilloscope, it's the latest rage in test equipment - a "black box" that turns your desktop PC into a full feature storage oscilloscope at a price that won't wreck your bank account. The one I got is a Velleman PC-Lab 2000se designed in Holland and built in Taiwan. Price? Less than \$140 delivered. It's a single channel 'scope. For a few bucks more you can get a two or even a four channel 'scope allowing you to compare simultaneous phase relationships between various signals. These scopes come either pre-assembled or in kit form. I was in a hurry so I bought the pre-assembled version. This may have been a mistake as no schematic or service information were supplied.

Now for the good, the bad and the ugly.

The *PC-Lab 2000se* is powered by an external 9V DC, 500 mW power module. There's no on/off switch so you have to plug the module into a wall outlet to turn the unit on. This is more an inconvenience than a fault, but it seems to me that for a few pennies more a switch could have been provided. At least a little red light tells you the unit is plugged in and running.

Loading the software from the supplied CD reveals a picture that resembles a standard oscil-

loscope screen and its more important controls, which are operated by your computer's mouse. Sensitivity is essentially flat from DC to 12 MHz. I checked the calibration against a 10 MHz output from my *Elecraft K2* and, sure enough, I got 10 complete cycles across the screen with the display set for .1 microsecond per cM. In this respect, the *Velleman* is a distinct improvement over my old *Tektronix 503* which was limited to 450 kc. To read RF on the *Tektronix*, I'd have to bypass the internal amplifiers and drive the vertical deflection plates directly - not a comfortable prospect, as the "gun" end of the 'scope CRT operates at - 3000 V potential.

For awhile, I was confused by the vertical deflection readings I was getting until I checked calibration with a known DC power source. It turns out the relationship between the indicated and actual operation of the "buttons" on the screen was totally out of whack. This has not yet been resolved. A lengthy e-mail correspondence with a Velleman "technical representative" has proved frustrating and unproductive. The person at the other end of the line, whose first language is obviously not English, can't seem to understand what I'm talking about. She seems to think I'm completely out of my mind and don't know how to read numbers. She may be correct on the first count but I certainly know the difference between 1.0V/cM and 0.1V/cM! I "solved" the problem by drawing a picture of the vertical deflection pushbuttons with the correct labels and pasting it on the front of my PC. I guess my complaint is that if you're looking for technical support from *Velleman* forget it. You're on your own.

There is no provision for a horizontal input so you can't create Lissijous figures. This is more than an inconvenience. At times, it's the only way to get an accurate zero-beat between two signals. The *Velleman* does come with a terrific bonus, however. With a click of the mouse it morphs itself into a full-fledged spectrum analyzer. I haven't had occasion to use this feature yet, except to check that it works.

It will be useful, however, when I install the SSB board in my K2 and need to check it for spurious output.

My final complaint is with the supplied X10 probe. It has a tendency to come apart while in use. I haven't found a way to defeat this problem. The way the thing is constructed it can't be made to stay together and still use the spring-loaded clip-on connection. Oh well, if I can find my old *Tektronix* probe, maybe it will work with the *Velleman*.

These faults are minor compared to the luxury of owning a workable RF storage oscilloscope. If you're an experimenter or kit builder, I highly recommend you investigate one of the many PC oscilloscopes available. The *Velleman* is not a top of the line model but it is relatively inexpensive and it's a good starting point from which to explore the field.

Meeting Minutes of CCARC January 10, 2007 (Amended 1-11 per C. Jones request)

(There was a snow storm for 3-4 hours immediately prior to the meeting.)

Meeting called to order at 1900 hours by Chuck Jones. President.

- Chuck suggested that in future, there shall be a Pledge of Allegiance to the flag at the start of the meeting. Those in attendance agreed. There being no flag in view, that was not done tonight. Need to arrange for a flag to be available.
 - There was a self introduction of those in attendance, numbering 8.

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- Chuck presented a run-down of the new Committee chair persons:
- Activities Leah Benadum
- Public Relations Tom Newcomb
 - Public Service Nita Lyman
 - (Note: Public Service may be deleted per new By-laws.)
- Publications (Newsletter) Currently Chuck Jones, Bob Sampson, Nita Lyman. A new staff is needed.
- Membership John Moore, Chair; Frank Doherty; Paul Benadum; Nita Lyman
- Technical Casey Hicks identified as Honorary Chairman, Steve De-Biddle is the Functional Chairman. Bob Sampson, Chuck Metz. (Note: new By-laws may show Trustee as being director of Technical Committee.)
- Health & Welfare (Sunshine committee) Nita Lyman
- Use of the Tenforward website may become an issue. After the website was sold by Sheldon Koehler N7XEI use of the website had been gratis. That may change in April and Sheldon is attempting to arrange for a continuation of the gratis use.
- Casey Hicks has asked if there are suggestions for any changes to the repeater controller, or other features to be added. No response.
 - There was discussion on there being refreshments available at meetings. It was pointed out that coffee and doughnuts, etc. could be made available using a donation arrangement which would likely pay for itself.

A team would be needed to assure that everything worked out OK, and that we never leave a mess for the Fire Department. (The Fire Department has specified regulations for the use of their facility with their new permission to use it for 2007.) The equipment and supplies would be kept in a tub, probably in the radio room, for our private use. Apparently some individuals did not think this would work, but Steve DeBiddle W6MPD has done it before with success.

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Meeting Minutes Continued...

It was pointed out that the QTC should identify what each months upcoming program was, and mention that refreshments will be available, to encourage attendance.

- John Moore explained his interest in preparing a New Member's kit and what it could contain. Chuck McGilvra offered to put the entire set of QTC issues on CD to be included. It was also mentioned that Paul Benadum, who makes ID tags, etc. could make new tags for each member, to be included. He would be paid for this of course, from the Treasury, but any of the members could also purchase these independently to make it possible for everyone to have similar badges, if desired. The latest edition of the Directory would also be included, along with a welcoming letter and information on Nets, Field Day, and the Christmas party.
- There was a brief discussion on the picnic each year with the Canadians, which will be continued.
- There was discussion on Field Day and Chuck Stroeher, Al Fisk and Joe Damm will work on the equipment and set up issues. Leah Benadum has been instrumental in arranging some of the other activities, as has Nita Lyman, who got a special mention from Ed Bruette N7NVP (WWA Section Manager) last year for the tent set up, as being the best one in District 2.
- There was discussion on Swap Meets and their benefits, but it was pointed out that this might benefit ARES more, as they have no income source, whereas CCARC does. It was mentioned that we might try one here, but that it was too late already to try and start one for this year. A committee would need to be established to pursue that. No conclusion. It was pointed out that Board meeting minutes should be read at each business meeting. Agreed.
 - There needs to be a YL Lunch chairperson. No conclusion
 - Nita pointed out she has Russ Fish's donation of QST magazines. There either needs to be someone who would act as Librarian for this to make the magazines available for checkout, or determine a way to distribute these to prospective hams.

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Meeting Minutes Continued

- There was a lively discussion on the possibility of conducting a "50/50" raffle at meetings. 50% would go to the evening's winner, and the other 50% would be held in the bank account to go toward a nice gift certificate(s) from HRO, for award at the Christmas Party. It was moved, seconded, and approved that we do this, starting next month, ad infinitum. The tickets would be \$1, with 6 for \$5. W7DNA (Bruce Thompson) would be the likely candidate to manage this.
- Nita pointed out that we should purchase a new laminator for Frank (primarily) to use to seal the new membership badges. No motion was put on the floor to do this although it appeared to be popular.
- It was motioned, seconded, and approved that we purchase of a copy of Roberts Rules of Order to be on hand at meetings, and followed.
- There was discussion on donating funds to the Canadians to assist in their replacement of their radio tower recently lost in a windstorm. This is to be referred to the Board for a decision with respect to their approval and the amount.
- It was pointed out that there is a problem with everyone getting the QTC electronically. There is to be a verification of the QTC Yahoo e-mail database to assure everyone is listed and it is working. It was pointed out that hard copies of the QTC should be made available at meetings.
- Chuck is looking for more ideas for programs.
- There was discussion on forming a committee to deal with issues arising with SK's. This could be an action for Health and Welfare, but would take a cooperative Club effort to assist the survivor, even to the point of assuring that the Club is doing the "right thing" with inclusion in events to the extent desired for something like YL Lunches or occasional greeting cards.

Meeting adjourned at 2025.




