From HamRadioSchool.com, here are Five Common Mistakes New Hams Make:

1. Programming the radio incorrectly

Remember FOT (Frequency, Offset and Tone) all have to be set properly to access a repeater.

2. Failing to speak clearly into the microphone

With most radios, you need to hold the microphone (or handheld radio) a few inches from your mouth, speak clearly and aim your voice at the mike.

3. Expecting magic from an HT

Handheld transceivers (HTs) are awesome! But, upgrade the antenna on your HT.

4. Not listening enough

On VHF/UHF, find some of your local nets and listen in. You don't have to check into the net, just give it a listen and see what you can learn.

5. Not getting on the air.

It is the most important one on the list. Get on the air! Check into the net!

The Life of an Active Ham

On November 5th dad passed away peacefully at home almost within reach of his Brown Brothers iambic keyer. Born in Seattle on November 21st 1918 he almost made his ninety-eighth birthday, if it hadn't been for mom calling him. You see mom, N7MXE, passed on August 9th after ninety-five years. Most of you don't know but among mom's many accomplishments was being chosen queen of the Puyallup Daffodil Festival in 1938 at eighteen. Back then you were chosen by how photogenic you were which maybe is why she had her picture in the New York Times.


Dad was introduced to amateur radio as a teenager getting his license, W7GVV, in 1938 while attending electronic technical school in Seattle.

He worked in a hotel restaurant to pay for school and I always remember his story of the dumb waiter. When you pulled the rope to bring up the dirty dishes you never knew if you were to get dishes or roaches.

When he graduated school dad joined the ACS (Alaska Communication System) in Anchorage working out of the Federal building down town. [Note: In July of 2004 my wife and I accompanied my parents on an Alaska cruise and we stopped at the old Federal building. Turns out the room dad worked in looked unchanged but had been re-purposed.] Mom and dad were married in Seward in June of 1940 and lived in a small house in Anchorage where dad was able to do some hamming. Back then you had to change your call to the assigned area and his new call was K7GVV. An interesting bit of history is dad had a QSO with a ham in Hawaii early in the morning of Dec 7, 1941 before the bombing. That was the end of ham radio till after the war.

At the start of the war the ACS was integrated into the Army Signal Corp and all nonessential dependents were returned to the states. After a year dad's superior officers picked him for OCS (Officer Candidate School) and he was sent to Fort Mammoth, New Jersey. After OCS and training in radar dad spent the remainder of the war in Panama as a Radar Technical Officer.

After the war dad was reissued his original call (W7GVV) and went to work for Pacific Northwest Bell in Tacoma. He became active in the Tacoma Radio Club before moving to Port Angeles in 1955. For a year we lived at 10th and C Street where I remember a low dipole strung along the property line. At this time dad became very active CW traffic nets working WSN, RN7, PAN, IMN plus serving as net control for years. In his later years he included passing traffic on TCC Sunday mornings. The middle fifties were also the formative years CCARC of which dad served as an officer and trustee. As a youngster I remember some of the club meetings in the smoky basement room of the I.O.O.F building on west 1st street. As an aside, I'll always remember Hap Helgeson, W7AIB. He was a retired CG radioman who had a groove across the top of his head for wearing earphones for twenty years.



In retirement dad and mom moved to Freshwater Bay to a home they had built in 1981. Now dad put up the antennas he always wanted; an eighty meter delta loop, a tri-band beam on a crankup tower, and other smaller vhf/uhf and hf antennas. But even before then dad and Leo White put into operation the first two-meter repeater in the county. The antenna was on a wooden pole installed by the power company at Leo's house on the bluff on the west side of town. The equipment was eventually updated and moved to Striped Peak and was maintained by dad. Outside of amateur radio dad was the technical advisor the Joyce TV Improvement District.

This was a group of individuals that got together to improve reception of the Seattle TV stations. They installed TV translators on Striped Peak for channels four, five and seven. Originally the stations were received on the respective channels but a technology progressed the stations were down linked off a satellite making reception much less subject to the vagaries of propagation.

As a supporting member of the ARRL dad was appointed Assistant Director to cover Clallam County by Mary Lou Brown, NM7N in 1994, a position he held till just a few years ago. Dad also dabbled in SSB, ATV, and a bit of PACTOR, and AMTOR. He is also on the ARRL A1 Operators Club along with Hap. Many young hams passed the novice test in dad's basement ham shack including myself and he was an elmer to many more. Now that I'm sorting out his seventy-eight years of ham stuff one can follow the progression of technology and appreciate the knowledge needed in the earlier years of ham radio to build and maintain a station. And with that we say farewell to an Active Ham. 73 Dad
