Ham Radio Operators Aid Stroke Victim

Driving along Rt. 340 at 7:30 a.m. Tuesday, June 7, Purcellville resident Lee Phillips started to lose focus in his left eye and feel numbness on the left side of his body. He began to become a bit confused and to slur his words. He used his ham radio to contact JB Anderson, a former fire chief of 40 years, and asked him what the symptoms of a heart attack and stroke are.

Anderson was able to conclude less than 30 seconds into his conversation with Phillips that he was experiencing a mini-stroke. "[Phillips] was conscious about what he was saying, but was slurring his words," Anderson said. This was a big tip to Anderson that Phillips was experiencing a mini-stroke.

"When I found out where he was, he was about five to six minutes from the hospital; even if he did pull over it would have taken just as long for an Emergency Response Unit to reach him," Anderson said. "I called over to the hospital and notified an ER technician that Lee was heading over."

Throughout his drive to the hospital, four other ham radio users on Phillips' frequency, three of who are EMTs, kept talking with him to make sure he was functioning well enough to drive. One of the men knew Phillips had a tracking system through his portable two-meter ham radio, which was key to making sure he arrived safely.

Using the tracking system, Anderson was able to see where Phillips' vehicle was and send the information to Winchester Hospital.

"One of the guys on the radio told his wife to bring up the map on her computer and call 9-1-1 if I stopped," Phillips said. The map is relatively high-tech and the use of a ham radio's call sign allows the viewer to see if the vehicle is in motion, where it is, and the other ham radios that have contacted the radio you are searching.

The stroke affected Phillips' left side and eye so much as to ruin his depth perception in his left eye. Despite this, Phillips decided to drive himself to the nearest hospital. Thinking back on it, Phillips realizes it wasn't the smartest idea; however, having his ham radio was crucial to seeing him through it safely.

Fortunately for Phillips he made it to the hospital, where there was a person waiting at the doors with a wheelchair to take him straight to an emergency room. With his records already pulled, the doctor was able to perform tests and soon verified that he had indeed experienced a small stroke.

Following his diagnosis, Phillips was given an MRI. Upon getting the results, it became apparent that this was not his first stroke.

"I had four or more in the past, but this was the first one I felt as it happened," Phillips said. Due to this, the doctors kept Phillips overnight to observe him.

With his history, Philips's doctor told him he needed to make some lifestyle changes, especially slowing down. "I was normally supercharged," Phillips said. "I own and run two companies along with my wife, The Doggie Wash and Vibrant Pets."

Having to manage his time between the two Purcellville businesses has taken a lot out of him and he feels that slowing down is going to be harder than it sounds. However, he realizes the issues with not slowing down. "Mini strokes are normally precursors to big ones," Phillips said. "If I don't slow down I am also more at risk to have another stroke."

Along with slowing things down, Phillips was given a prescription for physical therapy, which would help him strengthen his left side and adjust to having no depth perception in his left eye.

If it wasn't for his ham radio, no one knows what might have happened, he said. The radio allowed him to be tracked all the way to the hospital, which prevented him from being stranded had he lost control of his vehicle and allowed a member of the hospital staff to be waiting for him when he arrived. "I learned how great the ham community really is," Phillips said. "If it wasn't for them I might have crashed or not made it [to the hospital]."

Phillips has been an amateur radio operator since 1966 and has several ham radios today.

He was en route to the Upperville Horse Show when he experienced his stroke and said that another ham radio operator was able to take over for him at the show.

Looking back at the situation, Phillips considers himself lucky. Besides getting immediate treatment, it was fortunate he didn't get into an accident while driving to the hospital.

But Phillips wants to make sure that no one else does what he did and offers the advice, "Don't be stupid, pull over and call 9-1-1." Reprinted with permission


